Japanese GP will be the last for 5 weeks

The Japanese Grand Prix (Gp) is only the third race of the new Formula 1 season, but it will be the last one for five weeks with events in Bahrain and Saudi Arabia called off because of the war in Iraq. The next F1 race is not until May 1 in Miami. Here's what we've learned so far from races in Australia and China with the Japanese Gp set for Sunday. Mercedes and Ferrari have adapted best to Formula 1's most radical change in power and chassis in more than a decade.

Ferrari's Lewis Hamilton and Charles Leclerc have flipped finishing third and fourth. Mercedes and Ferrari are the favourites on Suzuka's figure-eight circuit, located in central Japan and among F1's most storied venues.

Suzuka is a vastly different circuit from Australia — a short course in Melbourne and Shanghai, which resembles many of the newer Formula 1 venues. Suzuka is old school — narrow, twisting with only one major straightaway for passing.

Hamilton has won the Japanese Gp five times, but times at Suzuka as he surges back near the top of the standings after two races.

McLaren's woes: McLaren has



struggled after missing last season's drivers' championship, with Lando Norris, and adding the constructor's

title for good measure. But McLaren failed to even start the race two weeks ago in China with engine and electrical faults.

Asked on Thursday if the problem had been resolved, Norris replied, "I think it took a little bit of time to figure things out, but yes. Of course it hurt us as a team, certainly didn't make us look good to have two cars not starting a race."

Norris talked up the team which includes Oscar Piastri. It had the best car on the grid in the last two seasons, having won the constructor's title each time.

"Now it just as good a time as ever to prove exactly what we can do as a team — against Ferrari, against Mercedes, who are performing very well at the minute," Norris said.

Focusing on versatility, says Sai Sudharsan

Sai Sudharsan is prioritising versatility over high strikeouts heading into the IPL, as the Gujarat Titans opener returns from a rib-cage injury, having worked on his game to upgrade skills after a tough red-ball stint with the Indian Test team.

The 24-year-old, who was the 'Orange Cap' with 798 runs at a strike rate of around 145 last IPL season, didn't have a great time with the Indian Test team, aggregating 302 runs from six Test at a below-par average of 27.45.

While he got a couple of half-centuries in 11 Test innings, by and large his performance was underwhelming. "I think I was grateful enough for the experience. First thing, I am not looking at it as a low or high performance but as a fall because it has shown me what I have to improve," Sudharsan told PTI in an interview ahead of the 99th edition of the Indian Premier League. Playing for

India has been an eye opener of sorts for the batter.

"It has shown me what I have to work on and grind when I go forward in Test cricket. So, I am not thinking of it as a failure. I am thinking it has given me an opportunity to work on new things and it is helping me to evolve."

"And obviously, it has made me believe in myself more," the genial southpaw said. Sudharsan endured a torrid time towards the end of the last season as he didn't have big scores against South Africa and then sustained a rib cage injury while playing in the Vijay Hazare Trophy.

He got a two-month break, and he turned adversity into an opportunity as he got time to work on his skills along with his childhood coach, Jayakumar.

"Emotionally, I am not looking at it as a very low score or very difficult times because I've gotten an opportunity to work on my body and work on my batting," Sudharsan gave his perspective.

IPL 2026: RCB look to regroup, CSK, KKR, MI hunt lost glory

Relegated defending champions seeking to regroup after an unprecedented tragedy, decorated sides chasing lost glory, two stalwarts fighting for relevance and a clutch of hopefuls eager to impress, the 2026 IPL, starting Saturday, is poised to offer intriguing scenarios over the next two months.

Title holders Royal Challengers Bangalore, who host Sunisers Hyderabad at the Chinnaswamy stadium in the tournament opener, would have liked to enter the league's 19th edition with a lot more swagger and pomp.

But an austere atmosphere surrounds the match, as the memory of it fans who lost their lives in the June 4 stampede outside the stadium during the team's title celebration dominates the lead-up to the match.

The Karnataka state cricket Association and RCB management have also taken steps to keep the unfortunate souls' memory alive.

The ESCA announced leaving its permanent empty seats in the stadium, which itself had to go through a few uncertain months before the receiving necessary permissions from state government authorities to host the IPL matches. RCB players would wear jerseys printed on it on their back during the practice session on the first match day. While these are highly appreciable measures, cricket on the ground often transcends such emotions and empathetic symbols.

It does not require any trained eyes to understand that both RCB and Sunisers are thin on bowling resources after missing key players. RCB will be without the marmalade josh Hazlewood and left-arm seamer Yash Dayal. Sun

Compound archers dominate with mixed team gold, clean sweep in men's individual

Indian compound archers defied a dominant performance, clinching the mixed team gold and women's team silver, while also sweeping the men's individual podium at the Asia Cup World Ranking Tournament Stage 1 on Friday.

With the ignition of the individual medal, India's overall tally swelled to two gold, two silver and four bronze medals, matching their eight-medal haul from the previous edition.

The Indian contingent also remained in contention in two more finals later in the day — women's recurve individual (Rishi Puro) and men's recurve team as they are all set to surpass the tally of the 2025 Stage 1 event held here.

The highlight of the day was a clean sweep in the men's compound individual section, where Uday Gambhir

managed to drill in three perfect arrows in the final end to down local favourite Penaraw Rattanapongkiet 145-144 in a tense bronze playoff. The 31-year-old former World Championships silver medalist had a two-point deficit after three ends.

Asked how they plan to repeat last year's performance all over again, Shubank said, "We will take it match by match because ultimately we are going to win. If we keep thinking we reached the final last year, there will be a lot of pressure on us. So our immediate aim is to prepare for the Bangalore qualifier. I think against Chennai Super Kings, we will win." (PTI)

Impact Sub a good innovation: RCB head coach Flower

The Impact Sub rule might have vertically divided the opinion of players and pundits but Royal Challengers Bangalore head coach Andy Flower on Friday termed it a "good innovation" as it offers tactical flexibility to teams in the IPL.

Each team's choice of an Impact Sub is such as India's Test and ODI skipper Shubman Gill and former captain Kohli. Shubman thought the Impact Sub rule takes the skill out of the game. "I think it has been a good innovation, it's interesting to be part of it. You're making decisions on the impact player, and I think it's interesting for the audience to debate what's right and what's wrong, so tactically it's quite an interesting addition to the game," Flower said on the eve of IPL's 2026 season-opener against Sunisers Hyderabad.
